1. Roll Call/Attendance

2. Guest Speaker: Dr. Empie

How many of you work in dining now or ever have? I want to give you an overview of some dining things you should know. Dining Services has four main goal, two of which are good quality food and jobs for students (30 full time staff, all others are students). To be fully operational we need 300 employees but currently have about 200. 9 of the 30 full time employees are cooks making recipes. 5 of those 9 positions have been vacant this year. Unemployment is low so we have to draw staff from elsewhere. We are also competing with similar places like Fareway with better hours and competitive pay. Right now we are using some temp staff in those full time positions, some of those people are less qualified. We also aim to provide people with initial work experience and practice in a new job setting. Public relations for the college is another goal for Dining Services, like hosting special guests and events for the school. Wartburg dining is not a contract service; everyone works for the college. Our budget is tied into the board plan budget. Other money is added as we sell stuff which belongs to Wartburg at the end of the year. I ask you to put in perspective when you say "I pay \$7 for this lunch", that money goes into a larger budget to pay for many things, not just your one meal. My areas are working to get money out of our budget expenses. Dining Services is part the \$1.2 revenue enhancement. The survey taken in November will help make the decisions we make in the future. Comment cards are similar but less of a decision piece. We have a 5-week cycle in the Mensa with some certain seasonal changes. We do those "recipes from home", testing for students to try and see if they would like to see those in the Mensa. Please vote when those come out. The cycle changes in May Term. This helps train staff in times of change and helps in terms of food waste and cost. We had to do something for the Taco Bar to help our low staffing issue. It is a more noted thing that staff can count on changing. We look at the GET board plan meals and the time distribution of meals eaten at all the facilities around campus. We have seen coaches on campus tell their athletes to eat differently than they have before. In some cases, those new diets are typically only available for those with prior dietary restrictions. The reality is that we can't change the whole menu for one group of people. We have had a lot of notices about the Taco Bar. I'm sorry that was such an ordeal but it helped to relieve a whole bunch of steps. We do most of our menu planning as a group but

all changes must go through me. I would be happy to talk to you about any changes. Sometimes we put two common favorites items against each other at a meal time to be able to manage expenses. I have had a lot of comments about wanting chicken every day. That will not happen. That completely tanks the menu variety. Chicken is very expensive in terms per portion. We use over 700 cases of chicken for the grill every school year. We can look at putting things on more often. We just taste tested a new chicken product because we want one with less additives, but of course they all have additives. We want people to eat the cleanliest food as possible. We stopped buying pre made croutons and salads. They were not being eaten so the fresh made salads and croutons will be coming back. We couldn't go back to making pre made soup because there was just so much in them so we will keep making them from scratch. Vegetarian issues usually come up at this meeting, we are working to get less sauce items. On the survey, vegetarian answers are invalid because most people answering aren't vegetarian or vegan. We are seeing a lot of non-vegetarians eating the vegetarian option which is a good thing.

Senator Jacobs: Has any more progress been made on the nutritional information labels?

Dr. Empie: We have a food management system like an accounting system where we will have to buy another piece of the program, which we said we would do. But we have to know that what we are putting out is really in there (the food). We are getting a lot closer, 75% the way there. We have also had a set back with the less experienced staff.

Senator Keller: As a student manager, I have had a lot of students asking to have the kitchen focus on the Taco Bar and have it come back for lunch on like Tuesday and Thursday, is that a possibility?

Dr. Empie: We need the consistency to do that, which we don't have. When the managers are doing the cooking, which is what has been happening, and if we can get enough students employees, then we can do that.

Treasurer Jobes-Ryan: Have you considered having students with majors in that field and database experience take on that task?

Dr. Empie: We need to get the information on the recipe side first. I would certainly use a student for that when we get there. We have someone who works on the system but we are waiting on the prevision of the cooks. This has been caused by inexperienced staff to verify food content.

Senator Milius: You mention the understaffing, what has been done or what reasons would a student want to work in Mensa over admissions?

Dr. Empie: I don't know why anyone would want to work in the Mensa over admissions. We have looked at raising pay but we don't have enough to make people leave other jobs. The other problem is that in the last three years we haven't had enough students. We have to compete with \$9/hr. jobs. With the cooking staff problem, we are trying to bring people from out of town, their work (cooks) is harder than anyone else's. There just is not enough overall for everyone on campus.

Senator Singleton: Is there a reason why we don't use the sound system in the K-Dit?

Dr. Empie: You have to do it yourselves. Caution, some people go into there to work. Not a problem at all if you can get it done.

Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: You said that typically you would have 300 students working in Dining Services. Do you budget for that much?

Dr. Empie: If we had enough now, we wouldn't be able to pay now.

Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: If we get rid of the program, why can we not raise the wage?

Dr. Empie: We can, the problem is that we can't really work like this. The enrollment for the college would determine what we would do for the future. We really want students to have jobs first. Once we raise the pay, we can't cut it. You just don't do that. We have had to have temp people come in and cover student positions.

Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: Can we take more steps like circulating areas?

Dr. Empie: Yes, exactly. Email me with any other questions.

President Vogel: Other institutions like Wartburg open the dining halls for studying. What are the limitations for us doing that?

Dr. Empie: I'm not opposed to that but someone has to be there to monitor it. There are still some access issues. They have done it in the past and no one has used it. I understand that there are enough places for people to go otherwise. Is that a real concern? I am okay with exploring that, it's just a big space. My office is right where you get your ID picture taken, feel free to come visit me.

8. Student Issues

- Senator Jacobs:** Löhe Hall is having Wi-Fi connectivity issues. The issue is that most people can't connect and not just a few people. I know IT has been working on it.
Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: Has anyone contacted Garry directly yet?
Senator Jacobs: I think so, I just wanted you guys to know it was still happening.
Parliamentarian Zmudka: Knights has been having toilet paper restocking issues. The toilet paper is put in a locked cabinet which our keys can't get into. We have talked to the RHD who says they don't know what to do and does not seem like much effort is going in. I don't think they realize our keys don't unlock it.

Dean Kittle: Also, with the freezing ground, we would have to put it in now.

Dean Kittle: We are covered for safety and there is a bladder between the ice and court. We will be talking to the coach.

Senator Matthew: Do you know how you are building it yet?
Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: We will have a cover on bottom, build up snow on sides, then flood it with a nearby hydrant. It will be maintained and refilled every couple of days.
Senator Matthew: Do you have backup plan if there is no snow or it is too warm?
Administrative Ombudsperson Laudner: SRC can always consider a schedule delay.
